Captain Singleton is an adventure story, a travel narrative, and an exploration of society from the point of view of its outcasts. Published in 1720, the year after Robinson Crusoe, Singleton has been traditionally categorized as a minor work, but it is open to much fuller appreciation in today's critical climate. It is both a novel of ideas and an arresting

story of immense geographical sweep, which includes one of Defoe's most memorable characters, William the Quaker.
